

There Will Come Soft Rains

Theme:-

1. Ray Bradbury's story is a chilling tale of a post-apocalyptic world in which no humans remain.
2. "There Will Come Soft Rains" takes up a common course of the mid-twentieth century. As technology advanced at a rapid pace, particularly following the development of the atomic bomb in the 1940s, a fear of robots taking the place of humans developed.
3. Another theme in the story is that machines can serve as both help and a hindrance. The machines inside the house are clearly of great benefit as they zoom around cleaning the house.
4. Yet a nuclear event has apparently resulted in the destruction of all human life. For every advance in technology, some harms to result.
5. Nature, however, goes about its everyday business: the sun continues to rise and set, the sun shines, and the soft rains come.

 - a) Whom does "I" refer to?
ans. "I" refers to the AI controlling this house.

ans. The addressee is Mrs. McClellan.

c) Why isn't there any preference expressed?

III Answer the following:-

1. Justify the title "There Will Come Soft Rains".

ans. Ray Bradbury's science fiction story shares the title of the poem by Sara Teasdale. The title refers to the passage of time and predicts what is to come in future. There is hope and optimism hidden in the title indicating the cycle of life. Both the story and the poem are based on the same theme that concerns man versus nature and how nature would carry on whether the humans were around or not.
